What is Arts Award Discover?

Arts Award develops a young person's creativity, communication and leadership skills and is a nationally recognised qualification. It has five levels: Discover, Explore, Bronze, Silver and Gold. By completing all parts of this log book, they will achieve their Discover level Arts Award.

There are three parts that need to be completed. Your child can record their activities in this Arts Award Log book:

1. Take part in different arts activities, such as drawing, collage, sculpture making and record what they have discovered.
2. Find out about the forest, artists who work in the forest or whose work they can find in the forest.
3. Share what they have done on their Arts Award journey.

The next step is to have the log book assessed by an Arts Award advisor. To receive the Discover certificate, please follow the instructions on the final page of the book. This information can also be found on the Forestry England website: forestryengland.uk – search for Arts Award.
