



With long days and many hours of sunshine, summer is a great time to get outside and explore. These activities will help you to look a little closer at the natural world during the summertime.

Setting the scene

These activities are aimed at 4 to 11-year-olds but can be adapted for any age.

Exploring textures Touch in summer

Find a tree that you think looks interesting. Run your hands along the trunk.

- What do you feel?
- Do you think you notice more with your eyes closed?
- Find another tree, do other species of tree feel different?

Notice the sounds of summer

Find a safe place to stay completely still and quiet with your eyes closed.

- What can you hear around you?
- Are the sounds close or far away?
- Are they sounds of people, animals or something else?
- How would the sounds be different in different seasons?

While out in the forest, gather some good sticks for making things – perhaps a picture frame, a magic wand, a walking stick.

- Look carefully at your sticks to decide what each should become.
- How does its shape and size affect what you can make?

Shadow puppets

With the sun high in the sky for many hours each day, you often get lots of shadows.

- Have a go at creating shadow puppets of different forest animals with your hands.
- Invent a short story and create your very own puppet show.

Butterfly detectives

Find an open, sunny place, with long meadow grass and flowers, and look out for butterflies.



- How many different types of butterfly can you spot?
- Do they all like the same flowers?

Woodland wander

Go adventuring off the main tracks and find a special place deep in the forest to have a secret summer picnic.

Pedal power

To explore even further, find a forest cycle trail and ride a bike around the forest.





Forest habitats

Sometimes Forestry England staff leave fallen trees and branches on the ground because they provide fantastic homes for minibeasts.

Find some deadwood and carefully lift it to see what is living under it and on it.

Make sure you replace the wood after you finish.

Hide-and-seek

There are lots of animals hiding in the woods in dens, down burrows and in hidey-holes in the tree trunks.

- Pretend to be a woodland animal and play a game of hide-and-seek among the trees and other forest plants.
- Who can find the best hidey-hole?
