# Walking trails at Haughmond Hill

Explore our waymarked trails to follow in the footsteps of history. Follow the trails out to the front of the hill for commanding views across the River Severn and Shrewsbury to the South Shropshire and Welsh hills beyond.

## Trail information

#### Wilfred's Walk ••• 5.4km ( 3.3 miles)

This is the longest trail on the hill, and takes you past the site of Nancy Spragg's cottage. Not much of the only home on the hill remains, but can you spot the lilac and plum trees that once grew in her garden? From the Iron Age enclosure you can look out over Shrewsbury to the hills beyond. Sections of the trail have exposed roots and rocks, and some parts will be muddy especially after wet weather.

#### Henry's Hike ●●● 2.5km (1.5 miles)

This circular walk takes you across the central plateau of the hill taking in views of the Wrekin to the east.

This trail has rocky sections and exposed roots but is mostly flat. Expect the trail to be muddy seasonally and after rain.

### Corbett Easy Access Trail •••

#### 1.2km (0.75 miles)

This is a surfaced trail through mixed woodland with plenty of benches along the route. It's suitable for wheelchairs, mobility scooters and buggies.

### Geo Trail 000

#### 1.3km (0.8 miles)

Follow ancient oaks and young trees to one of the best views in the area across Shrewsbury. Stop halfway and visit the viewing platform over the quarry; a must for any budding geologists or anyone who likes dumper trucks!

This is a well-surfaced trail suitable for mobility scooters and buggies which runs gradually uphill. The final 100m onto the viewpoint is not surfaced, but in dry conditions is suitable for buggies. Sections of this trail can be muddy after rain.
