# Car park and entrance:

# Walk to the community woodland & coppice area:

This is a 1-mile walk and can take about 30 minutes. We can give people lifts in our all-terrain vehicle if needed.

This is a lovely flat walk through Silk Wood.

Here are a few things to be aware of:

- **Dogs are allowed off-lead**, we encourage participants not to interact with dogs.
- **We cross the Tree-Tops Walkway**, so let us know if you want to avoid heights.

# The community woodland:

There are hard paths to the main areas of the woodland, however some of the ground is uneven and there are brambles so watch your footing!

At the community woodland we have:

- **Compost toilets**
- **Hot water to make drinks**
- **Cold drinking water**
- **Hand washing facilities**
- Some biscuits and snacks but **please bring your own lunch.**
- **A small gazebo, some chairs, a tarpaulin, and sitting mats**
- **Spare coats and wellies** (please let us know your shoe size if you need to borrow wellies)
- The planting site is **wheelchair accessible**, and mobility scooters are available to hire for free. Please do let us know about access requirements.

# The coppice site:

The coppicing site is dense woodland with logs, plants and various potential tripping hazards, so watch your footing!

At the coppicing site we have:

- **Compost toilets**
- **Hot water to make drinks**
- **Cold drinking water**
- **Hand washing facilities**
- Some biscuits and snacks but **please bring your own lunch.**
- **The Silk Wood barn** will be the main **shelter area**, with **picnic tables**.
- **Spare coats and wellies** (please let us know your shoe size if you need to borrow wellies)
- Due to the nature of the coppice site, unfortunately, it is not wheelchair accessible.

# Be prepared for the conditions:

Our activities are all about getting outside! We always aim to spend the whole day outdoors wherever safe. We monitor the weather forecast and work with our groups to make sure they are prepared. You will need:

- **Long trousers**, even in the summer to protect you from thistles and ticks.
- **Sturdy shoes** with closed toes.
- **In the winter:** waterproofs, warm layers, hats and gloves.
- **In the summer:** sun hat, sunglasses, breathable layers.

# Activities:

## Summer activities (April - September)

- **Tree care:** This could involve weeding, laying mulch or surveying the trees.
- **Learning activities:** Measuring trees and their carbon, tree and flora identification, Bio-blitz and surveys.
- **Wellbeing in nature:** Through walks, observations, and gentle activities.
- **Jon Muir Award:** sessions to complete the John Muir Award with small groups.

## Winter activities (October - March)

- **Coppicing work:** (cutting hazel) involves working outdoors in winter conditions, in smaller groups with more specialised tools.
